
### From Your Regent: Vicki Gathje



Have you ever wondered why Easter Sunday is on a different Sunday every year or how "they" determine which Sunday will be Easter? Easter Sunday is the first Sunday following the first full (Paschal) moon after the Spring (Vernal) equinox. Confused? Let me break it down. This year, the Spring equinox is March 20<sup>th</sup>. The first full moon after March 20<sup>th</sup> is

March  $27^{th}$ . The first Sunday after March  $27^{th}$  is March  $31^{st}$ . Easter Sunday. Easy!

Early Christian officials thought it would be easier for the followers to understand the new religion if it could incorporate some of the same signs, symbols, rituals, and dates that the people were used to in their Pagan beliefs. It would be essential to choose dates similar to those already being celebrated by the village in which the believers lived.



Lent did not gain acceptance by the Catholic Church until 519 AD when believers started to decline from their devotion and priests called for a period of fasting to recall them to their original fervor (John Cassian, Antiquities of the Christian Church, book 21, chapter 1.) Some regions already practiced a forty-day period of fasting to honor the sun and many pagan religions celebrated the coming of spring and the "rebirth" of the land thus comparing the Christian belief that even though Jesus had died, He was "reborn" in his resurrection and that the followers need to prepare themselves for the anniversary of this event by the practice of fasting (Riley, 9 February, 2003.)

The period of Lent for Christians culminates in the celebration of Easter-the celebration of the resurrection of Jesus Christ. The name "Easter" has been said to derive from Estre or Eostre, the Anglo-Saxon goddess of spring and dawn. The festival for Eostre was celebrated on the day of the Vernal Equinox, the first day of spring. This was a celebration of the renewal of life in spring from the death of winter.

These are just a few examples of how pagan traditions and customs were used to represent different Christian liturgical holidays.

All the Christian movable feasts and the entire liturgical year of worship are arranged around Easter; which is preceded by the season of Lent, a 40-day period of fasting and repentance culminating in Holy Week, and followed by a 50-day Easter Season that stretches from Easter to Pentecost. Easter is the oldest Christian holiday and the most important day of the church year for it celebrates Jesus Christ's resurrection from the dead. It is a Christian holiday that celebrates the central event of the Christian faith: the resurrection of Jesus Christ three days after his death by crucifixion. The resurrection of our savior Jesus Christ is the centerpiece of our religion—the Christian religion. The Apostle Paul even goes so far to say that if Jesus Christ had not been resurrected then the Christian faith is worthless and futile (1 Cor. 15:14-17). Therefore, without Easter there is no Christianity.

Jesus' resurrection gave us (humanity) a second chance and the ability to know God and grow closer to Him than ever before. Because of our fallen nature, Jesus Christ gave us an opportunity we could never experience without his death—a chance to spend eternity in heaven. What an event to celebrate!

### From the Desk of Father Kurt...

### Jesus is the true vine and we are the branches

In the Gospel of John, Jesus tells his disciples that He is the true vine and that they are the branches. He goes on to add that apart from Him they can do nothing. This Gospel reminds me of the first homily I ever proclaimed as a deacon. Right after my ordination to the transitional deaconate, which every priest must first go through before he is ordained a priest, I was to preach the homily at the Saturday evening mass in my home parish in Winona. Knowing that I would be preaching to the home crowd I was very nervous and wanted to be sure that my homily was perfect. I spent hours contemplating every word that I would use and made sure that I had typed it all out exactly as I would preach it. As I was proofing my homily for the third time to make sure I hadn't made any mistakes, I noticed the words of Jesus, "apart from me you can do nothing." I started to feel a little guilty knowing that I probably trusted more in my own ability as a homilist than on Jesus my true vine. At that moment, the computer screen went blank and I lost every word that I had so painstakingly written.

Through this experience, I learned that my success in ministry depended very little on my own ability and gifts; but rather on Jesus and placing my trust in Him, my true vine. All of us who want to be disciples of Jesus must place our complete trust in Him, and root our lives in His. We root our lives in Christ by practicing our faith. If we never pray or go to Church how can we say that Jesus is our true vine? By praying and worshiping Christ on Sundays we draw our strength from Him, so that we can go and bear fruit in our daily life. Just as a radio or television will not work unless it is plugged into an outlet for electricity; we will not be able to accomplish the will of God for our lives unless we are plugged into Christ through prayer, worship and sacrament.

- The IBM grant money of \$500 was divided into two new, "start-up" programs. A brief description of each follows:

### 1. Our Lady of Guadalupe Free Clinic-Worthington, MN

Free clinic established primarily by Fr. Jim and several of his friends/contacts (many from Rochester.) They provide free health care for the uninsured of all races. They hold the clinic every 6 weeks on a Saturday. All volunteer staff. Members of the local parish feed and house the volunteers. Typical clinic schedule includes:

Arrive Friday early evening. Supper together. Receive lodging assignments in Worthington home. Saturday meet for breakfast. Work Clinic 9am-5pm (lunch provided at clinic or rectory). Evening mass if you wish. Supper together. Sunday meet for breakfast and debriefing/program. Leave Worthington mid-morning.


### Funds are used for:

- 1. Purchasing equipment that cannot be borrowed from other clinics
- 2. Purchasing laboratory supplies
- 3. Supplementing pharmacy purchases
- 4. Covering a portion of the travel expenses for some volunteers, administrative supplies

### Meeting Recap Notes Continued

### 2. Backpack Program at SCES-St. Charles, MN

Currently being established by Gretchen Hoffman, Title One director in St. Charles Schools. Very ground floor, hope to have up and running by March 15<sup>th</sup>. 99 <u>families</u> in the St. Charles Elem. School qualify according to the guidelines set by Channel One Food Bank. Want to start with 30 families this spring and gradually add more families. Work in conjunction with the Resource Center. Need financial sponsors, as they can purchase the food at a discounted rate through Channel One. This service will be free to parents/families.



### Typical schedule includes:

Backpacks are picked up with food on Friday afternoon, returned on Monday morning, and filled for the next week on Wednesdays. The idea is that there will be some food for the kids (elem. school aged) to eat on the weekend i.e. peanut butter, jelly, granola bars, cereal, fruit cups, pudding cups, etc.

Will eventually need groups to help fill the backpacks. The original 30 backpacks have been purchased. Rushford has just started a program like this and utilizes 11 churches to help them fill the backpacks.

### Funds are used for:

Help purchase food items for backpacks. For instance 14 boxes of cereal through Channel One cost approx. \$3.00. Other proposals will be for a community fund for monetary donations and for collections at each of the churches in St. Charles for food items.
